TIME OUT WITH LIONS DEAF CRICKET

We caught up with Chairperson of Lions Deaf Cricket Sivesh Poonsamy-Muthoo. He takes us through Deaf Cricket, his cricketing journey and what to look forward to in 2022. The first Deaf cricket match took place in 1928, when players in Cape Town challenged the Deaf cricketers of Worcester to a cricket match. It was only in 1976 that Johannesburg formed their own Deaf cricket team, which has been in existence ever since. The first Interprovincial tournament (IPT) took place in 1992, forming the South Africa Deaf Cricket Association now known as Deaf Cricket South Africa. The Lions Deaf Cricket (LDC) currently hold the most IPT trophy's.

Lions Deaf Cricket is affiliated to the Lions Cricket Union where 95% of all committee members are Deaf and all players are Deaf. Any players that want to join Lions Deaf Cricket will need to match the criteria for the hearing decibel requirement as set out by International Committee of Sports for the Deaf to qualify (Hearing Loss of at least 55 dB).

The team currently plays in the Lions Cricket Saturday 5 cricket league playing against hearing counterparts under Wits Lions CC which helps to enhance the standard of Deaf cricket. Lions Deaf Cricket takes part in the annual Deaf Cricket South Africa (DCSA) tournament competing against other Deaf provincial cricket teams and currently house 5 players from LDC that represent Deaf Cricket South Africa. The tournament forms the basis of selection to Deaf Cricket South Africa international tours in line with Cricket SA.

Sivesh Poonsamy-Muthoo, who has been an avid cricket fan for as far back as he can recall, was born fully Deaf;

"Since I was small, I have been playing cricket with my family and most of time with my neighbour and friends and have always looked up to our Protea players. Right now, I am Chairperson of Lions Deaf Cricket including Wits Lions CC, where I also play for both sides. I am an all-rounder where I open the bowling for CGLDC and Wits Lions and first or second change for DCSA. I bat in the middle order. I open the bowling for Deaf Cricket South Africa, and I have been privileged to play in three international tours thus far. I made my debut against India in the DICC Champions Trophy Dubai in 2016."

TIME OUT WITH LIONS DEAF CRICKET

There are no different rules to hearing cricket and all the ICC rules still apply to Deaf cricket, says Poonsamy-Muthoo, with the only real difference being that Deaf players cannot hear the nick off the bat to the wicketkeeper;

"Because of this, we rely heavily visually. We also cannot hear the cheering or shouting on the field and therefore eye contact with players and the captain is crucial. We use South African Sign Language (SASL) to communicate to one another.

"In terms of the best game that I have played, it was my debut against India in the DICC Champions Trophy in Dubai 2016. I took my first international 5 wickets in that match. The next match against Pakistan I scored my 1st international half century as a number nine batsman. This was my first time playing for Deaf Cricket South Africa and in an international tournament. I was only 23 years old at the time and I am currently still representing team DCSA. In terms of players that inspire me, there

are many players to whom I look up to, including international players like AB De Villiers, James Anderson, Glenn Maxwell,

Hasan Ali, Chris Morris, Kagiso Rabada and Dale Steyn. Their performances have made me learn something that I would like to showcase in my own way. Their talents and performance always make me want to strive to do better on the cricket field."

Lions Deaf Cricket recently attended the annual DCSA tournament however following COVID-19 protocols, as well as inclement weather, the tournament was suspended. In the Saturday 5 cricket league, Wits Lions CC has fielded a strong side winning a few matches despite training being affected due to strict protocols entering the training facilities as well as rain continuing to play a factor with several games being called off.

In closing Sivesh Poonsamy-Muthoo would like to thank the Venter family;

"The Venter family have been the pillar and the stronghold of LDC over the past 40 years. Dionne Venter, Stephen Venter and his two sons Kevin and Colin Venter have been instrumental in ensuring that LDC are the organization they are today. They have all represented Deaf Cricket South Africa where Colin is currently the captain. The family and the Deaf community managed to recruit me and many more other Deaf people to join cricket."

Interms of fixtures, the 2022 Inter-Provincial Tournament (IPT) will be played in April and Lions Deaf Cricket (LDC) will take part. It will form the selection for the Deaf Cricket of South Africa (DCSA) team preparing for the World Cup 2023. Wits Lions CC will continue to play in SA5 League under Lions Cricket throughout the season.



CRACKING CLUB FINALS THE BLACK WIDOW T20 DELIVERS



On Saturday 4th December 2021 history was made in Gauteng when the Ladies Imperial Premier League fixture was

officiated by lady umpires and scorers, thus all 22 players and match officials were ladies. The lady umpires in this historic fixture were Yashika Dinna & Sindy-ann Quaker.

Umpiring Landmark.

On Thursday 27th January Brad White officiated in his 150th first class match, umpiring a CSA four-day game between Western Province and the Imperial Lions at Newlands. Brad is the third South African umpire to reach the 150 mark, after Rudi Koetzen (220 matches) and Murray Brown (153).

Before becoming an umpire, Brad played first class cricket. As a left-handed opening batsman and medium pace bowler, he played for SA Schools in 1988, and the SA U21 side in 1989 and 1990. He played 78 first class matches, representing Transvaal (1988 -1995), Border (1996-1999) and Easterns (2000).

Brad started umpiring in 2001. He stood two years of club cricket in Gauteng and won 'Umpire of the Year' there in the 2002-03 season. In 2003 he was appointed to CSA's emerging panel, where he remained for five years, before being promoted to CSA's "A" panel for the 2008-9 season.

His first class debut came in October 2004, and his 150 games have included matches in New Zealand (November 2016), Australia (February 2018), and India (November 2018), as part of CSA's exchange program. Last year he stood in CSA's first class 4 day final.





LIONS CLUB CRICKET 2021/2022

Lions Club Cricket structure consists of the following:

52 clubs based in West Rand, Central and the South of Johannesburg

11 clubs based in Sedebeng. We thus boast a total of 63 clubs.

Clubs divisions are - Mens, Womens, Juniors.

Women's senior cricket takes place on Saturdays, and the mens senior cricket takes place on both Saturdays and Sundays.

Junior Cricket (under 7 to 15) is played on a Saturday morning.

Fixtures are played at government owned club facilities, schools and some privately owned facilities.

The 2021/2 season was a difficult one, where clubs faced challenges born from Covid: The restrictions placed on sport has seriously disabled the club structures. However, having said the above, the resilience showed by clubs is admirable.

Fixtures were put into place and clubs have had to adhere to the Covid protocols (bringing with it new challenges and financial strain). The Lions Cricket clubs worked hard and provided the mental and physical release of the COVID-19 pressures.

Clubs of colour worked extremely hard to maintain their numbers and provided a safe environment for players. The traditional clubs assisted the challenged clubs and a cross over of cultures took place.

Many clubs and players bloomed under tiring conditions and I have no doubt will continue to thrive in the years to come. We have witnessed the emergence of quality coaches across the board. And administratively, clubs who were lagging, have reflected growth in this space.

We struggle with council-based facilities, as the security placed at these facilities are not equipped to deal with the challenges that are faced daily.

Lenasia Sports Facility remains a thorn, it can be the best, but without the assistance of the city, we will lose use of this valuable ground.

Giving us approximately a games per weekend, providing game time to an access of 2000 plus players, coaches, umpires, scorers, ground staff.

This platform provides training for scorers, umpires and ground staff, leading directly to revenue for the end users.

Furthermore, we have the Imperial Premier Women's League and Lions Cricket Presidents Women's League.

The Lions Cricket Junior Structure consists of leagues under 7 to under 15 – a total of 122 teams and approximately 61 games a weekend.

So what then are our challenges?

Lions Cricket clubs (of colour) have the challenge of meeting the need of the activity: To do well, the club requires resources, cash, equipment and facilities – all clubs require funding to maintain themselves. Aclubals or equires assistance from council/other to maintain and the upkeep the facility and the financial aid to acquire the services of a good coach/es. Clubs also require transport to carry their members to games, clothing for their players, catering and the services fitness and mental trainers. All these shall come, so long as we continue to work smart, be kind, passionate and dedicated.

In terms of the on-field results from the first half of the season, I believe that they speak volumes of the strides made by the Lions Cricket family.

THE FUNDAMENTALS OF BATTING WITH PETER MOORES

The first thing I say to anybody who wants to play the game and wants to get better is that the skills don't change particularly as you move up the levels – it's the pace at which you've got to do them that changes. That's the big difference. In top-flight sport in general, it's the basics done at pace. And those basics are things you can't get away from.

FIND YOUR BALANCE

Whether you're batting, bowling or fielding, the first fundamental is balance. As a batter your head should be somewhere roughly inside your shoulders, both eyes level, going towards the bowler. A lot of the amateur batters that I watch are going towards extra-cover.

FEEL THE RHYTHM

The second basic of batting is alignment and alongside that comes rhythm, which is almost the forgotten art of coaching. Rhythm means you're relaxed – no one can play well if they're uptight. When you first go into bat you're going to be a bit uptight because it's the start of your innings. You've got to find a way to relax to get through that and know that you're only going to focus on the simple things: watching the ball and your balance. As you develop your skills you'll look more at things like playing late, letting the ball come to you, but the key initially is to keep it simple.

NAIL THE BASICS

In the world we live in now there's a lot of information out there which I think a club player can get lost in. But if you focus on going towards the ball with your eyes level, and you're letting the ball come to you and you're watching it hard, then you're not going to be a million miles off.

MAKE PRACTICE FUN

There's no quick fix to improve your game. To get better it's important to hit a lot of balls so it's necessary for the player and the coach to have fun doing that.

The ability to have fun and hit the ball is part of what you play the game for, and hitting the ball hard is a fundamental to becoming a good player these days.

Whether you're batting, bowling or fielding, the first fundamental is balance. There are two different ways of practising: there's practising to expand your game and there's practising to apply your game. If I'm netting and the focus of that session is on not getting out and playing like I would in a match, that is about application. Then in another session I can free up a bit and see if I can move my game forward.

I'd hate people to think they can't go out and look at different things, you just have to be focused in how you practise them.

PLAYING STRAIGHT

Hitting the ball back to where it came from, from straightforward throws, is a really nice way of starting off any net. It is probably one of the hardest things to do and it shows everything about your balance and alignment. It gets you to repair your basics and then from there you can expand your game.

Most things 'straight' in sport are difficult. Hitting the ball down the middle of a fairway, for instance: a simple concept but tricky to do.

A challenge you can face in a club net is the quality of bowling, as it might vary a bit. Try and arrive five minutes early if you can and get a few taps before the net session begins.

MAKING THE BALL COUNT

Regardless of whether it swings or seams, the key to bowling with the new ball is making the batter play as many times as you can and making the most of it when it's at its freshest. You've got to work out what type of pitch it is quickly and then adapt to conditions – deciding which length and line is best to bowl at. If it's a bouncy track, it's not a bad thing to get the batter pushed back a little bit with a shorter delivery, if that's part of your tactic.

Some players like taking the new ball more than others. It's a different feel. For some people it can feel a bit slippy out of the hand and they can't control it as well. But there are more wickets to be taken when you have the new ball than not, because the batsman is new and you've got your best chance with a big seam and a shiny, harder ball.

You can only begin to feel more comfortable with the new ball by practising with it as many times as you can.

HARNESS INDIVIDUALITY

In the modern game it's very much about individuality in your action and working from there. There are basic positions that you coach because that's been researched and it helps, but as a coach you want to encourage There are positions that some bowlers get into that put their back under strain, so as a coach you've got to make sure their action is safe. If it is, and they're bowling in decent areas and moving the ball, then there's no need to interject. If they are spraying it all over the place or not bowling particularly well then there will be technical things you can probably help with.

BUMPER RETURNS

With the bouncer, where you direct it depends on what you're trying to do. If you're trying to get the batsman out, sometimes a higher bouncer could be more effective, or a wider bouncer

could be more effective, or a wider bouncer where they have to fetch it. But generally speaking a ball directed at the neck is ideal, as brutal as that sounds.

The key with the delivery is you're trying to let the batsman know you're around. We've seen over the winter in Australia their fast bowlers hammered our tail-enders with short balls and it puts a bit of doubt in your mind. If you're getting a bit of a barrage and being forced on to the back foot, all of a sudden a length ball becomes a potent weapon. From a batter's point of view, no one likes the short ball, but some just cope with it better than others. No one wants to see it whizzing around their nose.

KEEP PERSPECTIVE

From a coaching point of view, it's very important to remember what it was like to be a player. You go through all your coaching badges and your levels and you end up on the other side of the line, but you need to remember what it was actually like to bowl fast every day and how hard it is.

No one is perfect, we're all humans and allowed bad days. You can forget that sometimes as a coach. You can get frustrated and think they should be doing better, but you've got to remember that you were there once and you didn't bowl well every day. Although a lot of coaches probably think they did!

DRILL!

Set out two lines of cones so you create a track from the top of your run-up all the way through to the batter in a straight line.

Then when you come in to bowl, make sure you stay between the cones when you release the ball and follow through. This will stop you changing direction, jumping into the wicket or falling away at the end, and it will encourage you to run through straight lines to your target.

JACK LEACH'S SPIN BOWLING COACHING TIPS

1. THE FUNDAMENTALS

Bowling spin is essentially about being about to land the ball in a good area with spin and shape. For me, it's about how I use my body to do that.

I find having a small delivery stride makes it easier to get up and over my front leg and then I really try to engage my front side, almost like a seamer does, to aggressively bowl the ball. And whatever the surface, I'm always trying to land the ball in a place that's attacking both sides of the bat.

2. TIGHT LINES

To a right-hander I'm looking to bowl at off stump most of the time. If it skids on from there it should be hitting the stumps or the batsman's pad. With that line the batsman has to play at the ball so then if it spins you're bringing slip into the game.

To a left-hander my line is usually just outside off stump from over the wicket. If there's rough there then I'll be aiming for it. If there's no rough, or if it's spinning from straight, then I might come round the wicket and attack the stumps, making sure that I'm pitching on middle so that if it straightens I've got a chance of an lbw. If it skids on then slip is in play.

3. THE WAITING GAME

I've learnt over the last couple of years, especially playing on spinning wickets, that sometimes it's actually more important to be patient on those wickets that are helpful to you.

4. USING THE CREASE

When I come round the wicket to a righthander I naturally get quite wide on the crease but I'm trying to find ways that I can actually get closer to the stumps, as that changes the angle the ball's coming down at the batsman from and it actually has to spin less to beat them.

I also try to use the depth of the crease, bowling some balls from 23 yards or 22-and-a-half yards. That allows me to bowl a ball of the same length from a different trajectory. This works well when a batter is coming hard at me, or if I notice they play the same sort of sweep shot to every length or trajectory I feel I can beat them in the air and get a top edge.

5. HONING YOUR RUN-UP

The pace of your run-up is very important and it's worth playing around with because it might be that you can get more from yourself at the crease by speeding it up or slowing it down.

Whatever the surface, I'm always trying to land the ball in a place that's attacking both sides of the bat

Graeme Swann had a lovely approach – he used to run in but then still managed to pause and get over his front leg. I've slowed my run-up down – now it's more of a walk into a slight jog and then bowl – because I found if I ran in too quick and then didn't have to do as much work at the crease I didn't get as much on the ball. It's about finding a pace of run-up that allows you to get a lot of energy on the ball.

The length of your run-up is important as well. Mine is nine paces, which is quite short. If my run-up gets too long then I feel like my delivery stride also gets longer and I find it harder to get up and over my front leg and over the ball.

6. THE DROP DRILL

Before I went to Australia last winter I was looking to see how I could beat batsmen in the air more than doing them off the pitch. One way to do that is getting drop on the ball.

I did a drill where I put a target eight feet from the popping crease and then a couple of metres away I placed a set of stumps. Then I tried to bowl it over that set of stumps but get it to drop in time to land on the target. Gradually I moved the stumps closer to the target, seeing how close I could get them to each other while still being able to drop the ball down onto the target.

7. PLAN IN ACTION

When we played Lancs recently I came up with a plan to Liam Livingstone, who's a good player of spin, that I thought would work to him.

I felt like his strength was hitting down the ground over mid-on so I wanted him to play as square as possible. I dropped mid-on deeper, as I didn't want him to have that easy shot at the start of his innings, and my mid-wicket came quite straight so he couldn't knock it down the ground for one either. Then I bowled one just outside leg stump and he tried to whip it, it caught the edge and slip took the catch.
